



# YEAR-END HIGHLIGHTS

- Delivered a number of presentations across the province, highlighting the success of the public-private partnership and the economic impact stemming from Bruce, Grey and Huron.
- Attended ROMA and spoke about the program's origin, local supply chain expansion, economic impact, the Nuclear Sector Sustainability Study and the potential large infrastructure projects in the region.
- Launched the Nuclear Sector
  Sustainability and Growth Study: reports
  were provided to Bruce Power and
  economic development leaders for the
  tri-counties of Bruce, Grey and Huron.
  Delegations outlining key findings were
  made to all County-level councils and to
  other stakeholders (ex. Huron Economic
  Development Board by request).

# YEAR-END HIGHLIGHTS

- At Bruce Power's Visitors' Centre, we hosted our Regional Steering Committee and elected officials from across Bruce, Grey and Huron. The event featured a comprehensive bus tour and an insightful presentation on effective advocacy strategies when engaging with provincial or federal governments.
- Launched the Clean Energy Frontier Plain Language Toolkit for local elected officials. The toolkit contains quick facts about the Clean Energy Frontier, Isotopes, Nuclear Waste and Clean Energy Storage in Ontario—the digital version of which has been viewed by 1,000+ people.
- Attended AMO to give a presentation on behalf of the Clean Energy Frontier, where we discussed everything from clean, safe and reliable power to medical isotopes and energy storage.
- The Clean Energy Frontier received Rural Economic Development (RED) funding: the program is using this funding to implement collaborative marketing and outreach campaigns to increase awareness of the clean energy cluster in the Bruce, Grey and Huron regions.



- Hosted international delegations with France and the UK, creating valuable networking opportunities within the nuclear sector and the Clean Energy Frontier region.
- Invited our Regional Steering Committee to attend the NWMO's Discovery and Demonstration Centre for an opportunity to ask question about Canada's plan for spent fuel storage and learn more about the adaptive phase management process.
- Visited Queen's Park to meet with many elected officials including the offices of the Minister of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade, and the Minister of Labour, Training and Skills Development, while also attending the Economic Developers Council of Ontario reception.

# **Empowering Kids in The Kitchen**











Kala Stuckless believes everyone deserves to feel comfortable in the kitchen and learn the skills they need to make nutritious food.

This passion and her own personal love of cooking inspired her to completely change her career in 2019 and enroll in Culinary Nutrition training. She recently launched <u>Stuckless Healing</u> <u>Co</u> and is already getting rave reviews from participants like Pippa, who had a blast at Kala's Empowering Kids in the Kitchen program.

The Level 1 classes run for 4 weeks and teach children, aged 7-12, the basics of kitchen safety, preparing and enjoying different foods. Each participant gets to keep the weekly recipe handouts as well as some take-home assignments called Kitchen Conversations to spur further learning.


From the outset, Kala was committed to creating a safe, easy-going class environment that was suitable for kids of all abilities and experience. The classes are offered in accessible community kitchens and she has various tools available that have bigger handles or, are easier to hold, to ensure everyone can participate. Kala even reached out to Community Living Kincardine & District and is using the All Kids Can Play workbook to continue learning and implementing inclusive practices.

In addition to the Empowering Kids in the Kitchen classes, which are offered in both Ripley and Kincardine, Kala has been hosting some special 1-day holiday baking classes and booking birthday parties. She is in the midst of planning her spring schedule and will be releasing registration information towards the end of January. Eventually, she hopes to offer Level 2 classes for kids, as well as Teen, and Adult cooking programs.

Allan said, "History books are what I like to look at. I like that they [the Library] have a lot of DVD movies that I haven't seen." The Library also hosts community movie days, and classes, like knitting. The Library is a great free and accessible resource where everyone is welcome!

# **Christmas Hamper Program**

Did you know that the Christmas Hamper program started in Kincardine in the mid-70's? At that time, it was run out of the homes of some very caring women who wanted to do something special at Christmas for those living in our area that could use some extra support. Since then, the program has evolved. For many years, the kids at KDSS would go door to door collecting items from community members to add to the hampers and donations have always been very generous.

Covid-19 changed the way that the Christmas Hampers were given out. They switched from giving items, to giving gift cards and the recipients have said that this is definitely the way to go. Gift cards are given for groceries, gas and pharmacy – but also toys and games if needed. Recipients can choose from a list of preferences and their cards can be delivered right to them by an army of volunteers who help with the program.

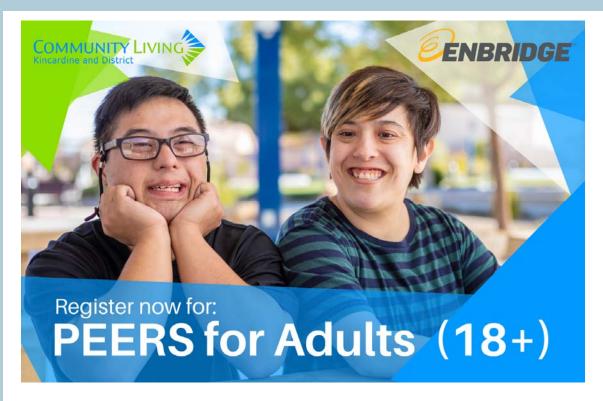
