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# Paisley Branch Moves to Community Centre

Bruce County Public Library is excited to announce the move of its well-loved Paislev Branch. The Branch will relocate to a bright and fully accessible location within the Paisley Community Centre, located at 391 Queen St. West. The new space allows BCPL to offer an enhanced library experience for all patrons, including a designated Children's area and a fresh collection of titles. The current Paisley Branch will be closed to the public starting Sunday, June 30.

In preparation for this transition, BCPL conducted a community survey. The feedbac gathered helped guide the new hours of operation and branch priorities. BCPL is grateful for the community input that helped shape the new and improved Branch environment.

Key to the renovation was the support from the municipality of Arran-Elderslie, and the funding they were able to secure to complete the second story renovations and install an elevator in the Paisley Community Centre, creating a fully accessible space. This ensures that all members of the public can access the Library with ease.

Total municipal funding for renovations for the library, a multi-use space on the second floor, and the elevator was \$585,000, including provincial funding support of \$218,000.

"The Library Board is thrilled to have a newly renovated, fully accessible space to better serve the Paisley community. Deep appreciation goes out to municipal staff who aided throughout the project. We invite everyone to visit and experience the revitalized location," said Board Chair Mark Goetz.

## Bruce County Rail Trail corridor improvements continue in the Mildmay area

Corridor improvements will continue on the Bruce County Rail Trail through July between Sideroad 30 and the Huron-Bruce Road, south of Mildmay.



#### June 28, 2024

Corridor improvements will continue on the Bruce County Rail Trail through July between Sideroad 30 and the Huron-Bruce Road, south of Mildmay. Some improvements that have been completed include trail widening and the application of aggregate material to improve trail accessibility. However, additional drainage work will continue, with a projected completion date of July 12, 2024. Trail access may be impeded, and temporary closures may be required at times.

The Bruce County Rail Trail is a multi-use trail that is approximately 80km long and extends from Port Elgin to the Huron-Bruce Road and from Port Elgin to Bruce Nuclear Power. The rail trail is a significant trail artery that connects several community trails through the towns of Port Elgin, Kincardine, Paisley, Walkerton, and Mildmay.

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
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## Bruce County Seeks Public Input on State of Arts and Culture

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## Bruce County Releases Housing Action Plan 2024-2026

The Housing Action Plan will further Bruce County's Strategic Plan 2023–2026 priority to increase housing options and encourage innovative solutions to build a strong and inclusive community.



#### July 05, 2024

On July 4th, 2024, Bruce County Council endorsed a <u>Housing Action Plan</u> that outlines 25 actions that Bruce County will take over the next two years (2024-2026) to help address supply and impact affordable housing locally.

The Housing Action Plan will further <u>Bruce County's Strategic Plan 2023–2026</u> priority to increase housing options and encourage innovative solutions to build a strong and inclusive community.

Actions focus on 6 different areas of practice including: research; policy development; new programs; incentives; engagement and advocacy for investment in housing solutions to meet the unique needs across the County. The actions will be led by the Community Development Office which was created to provide strategic leadership on priority issues for the County, including housing.

"The Community Development office established the Housing Cross Functional team to align the work of multiple departments to focus the County's capacity to initiate the 25 actions identified in this plan over the next two years." says

Claire Dodds, Commissioner of Community Development.

Actions that the County will take under this plan include:

increasing housing options to meet local needs;

permitting more housing development as-of-right;

implementing process improvements;

inventorying surplus government lands available to support affordable housing builds;

supporting non-profit and private developers proposing affordable housing through a new housing concierge program; advocating to other levels of government to provide tools, funding and programs that deliver affordable housing solutions in Bruce County.

The Bruce County Housing Action Plan is focused on increasing housing options for residents at all income levels. Actions included in this plan target non-profit community housing, below-market rental/ownership, private rental and home ownership. The County is also developing a separate Housing and Homelessness Plan that focuses on actions impacting homelessness services and emergency, transitional/supportive and community housing.

"The Housing Action Plan not only provides a realistic look at the current state of housing in Bruce County but focuses the County's capacity to take action on several parallel initiatives on housing. Bruce County is focused on finding ways that we can work with our municipal partners, Saugeen Ojibway Nation Environment Office and Indigenous Serving Organizations, non-profit and private developers, and other levels of government to increase the supply of housing and impact its affordability in Bruce County" says Chris Peabody, Warden of Bruce County.

The 25 actions outlined in the <u>Housing Action Plan</u> will be initiated over the next 2 years to help address the supply and affordability of housing locally. The Community Development Office brings together key staff across 5 County Departments to create focus and strategic alignment on the actions and activities the County delivers on housing.

**Background:** It is broadly accepted that housing is affordable when a household is not spending more than 30% of its income on housing costs. The province has also defined affordable housing thresholds for households of low and moderate income. For ownership housing, the affordable housing threshold is housing that is affordable to households with incomes at the 60th percentile. For renter households, the affordable housing threshold is 100% of average market rent as published by Canada Mortgage Housing Corporation (CMHC). In Bruce County, the affordable housing thresholds for 2023/2024 were rents below \$1,383 per month and ownership costs below \$377,300.

**About Bruce County:** Bruce County is an upper-tier municipality in Southwestern Ontario, Canada, made up of eight lower-tier municipalities and 73,396 residents. 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#### Reconciliation Action Plan Endorsed

On July 4, 2024, at a Special joint meeting of County Council with Council members from both First Nations, County Council endorsed the Bruce County's Indigenous Reconciliation Framework, and Bruce County's Saugeen Anishnaabek Reconciliation Pathway and Action Plan.



#### July 08, 2024

Starting in January 2022 Bruce County has been progressing through a comprehensive Indigenous Reconciliation Planning Initiative, featuring phased ongoing delivery of training and development of a Reconciliation Action Plan. To understand how to realize the 94 calls to action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) ongoing consultation and engagement with the Chippewas of Nawash Unceded First Nation, Saugeen First Nation, and Indigenous peoples and organizations, has and is continuing to occur. TRC defined reconciliation as the process of "establishing and maintaining a mutually respectful relationship between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal peoples in this country."

On July 4, 2024, at a Special joint meeting of County Council with Council members from both First Nations, County Council endorsed the Bruce County's Indigenous Reconciliation Framework, and Bruce County's

Saugeen Anishnaabek Reconciliation Pathway and Action Plan. This distinction-based approach acknowledges the Saugeen Ojibway Nation, as knowledge keepers in their traditional territory, and recognizes our unique government to government relationship with the Saugeen Ojibway Nation. As next steps Bruce County is committed to pursuing and embracing its

relationships and exploring reconciliation pathways with Indigenous serving organizations reflecting the distinct rights, histories, and priorities of Indigenous peoples. Ongoing relationship building and collaborative partnerships and new intersections can be anticipated to occur in Bruce County's distinctions-based approach to reconciliation and action.

"This is the first milestone in the process of reconciliation with the Indigenous people of Bruce County, and importantly the Saugeen Ojibway Nation. There is much hard work ahead to realize the commitment made in this Action Plan. I want to thank the Councils of both the Chippewas of Nawash Unceded First Nation and Saugeen First Nation; without their knowledge and willingness to engage in conversations this work would not be possible," said Warden Peabody.

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

These events offer an opportunity to come together as a community, in the spirit of reconciliACTION, to walk, learn, and reflect on the more than 600 kilometers Chanie Wenjack needed to get home.



# July 22, 2024

Everybody has their own reason to "Walk for Wenjack" in 2024. For some, it may be a moment to honour Chanie Wenjack and the many others like him. For others, it may be an opportunity to raise awareness of the true history of residential schools.

Beginning in 2016, the <u>Gord Downie & Chanie Wenjack Fund</u> has been challenging all people in Canada to "Do Something" meaningful. Bruce County, along with their valuable community partners, invite you to participate in upcoming Walk for Wenjack events planned in Neyaashiinigmiing, Wiarton, and Southampton this summer and fall. These events offer an opportunity to come together as a community, in the spirit of reconciliACTION, to walk, learn, and reflect on the more than 600 kilometers Chanie Wenjack needed to get home.

In 1966, Chanie Wenjack ran away from Cecilia Jeffrey Residential School in Kenora, Ontario. He walked for 36 hours along

the train tracks before dying of exposure on October 22. He was just 12 years old. His death sparked the first inquest into the treatment of Indigenous children in the residential school system. Chanie's story, tragically, is like so many stories of Indigenous children in this country.
