

"An Age-Friendly community is one that addresses both the opportunities and challenges of an aging population by creating a physical and social environment that promotes independent, active living, and enables older individuals to continue contributing to all aspects of community life," said Megan Garland, Director of Long Term Care and Senior Services, at the June 9, 2025 Bruce County Council Meeting.

The Age-Friendly Committee formed in June 2024 and is composed of representatives from the public sector, lower-tier

municipalities, and various organizations that support or serve seniors. The committee has focused on establishing a strong foundation for its work, including developing guiding principles and creating a community profile to frame its efforts. The committee's vision is to have Bruce County recognized as an Age-Friendly Community by the World Health Organization (WHO). To date, the committee has successfully completed its 2024 work plan, which included drafting terms of reference, defining guiding principles, and finalizing the community profile.

The Age-Friendly Committee has also partnered with Brock University students to begin drafting a comprehensive needs assessment for Bruce County. This research will help inform the development of policies and strategies that address the specific needs of older adults across the region. Looking ahead to 2025, the Age-Friendly Committee is committed to expanding community engagement to gather input from seniors to ensure their voices continue to shape future initiatives.


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No Injuries Reported at 659 Arlington Street Fire in Port Elgin

On arrival, local Saugeen Shores firefighters identified a single-unit fire on the second floor of the building. A full building evacuation took place. Crews were on scene until approximately 7:15 AM, at which time tenants were able to return to their homes.

There have been no reported injuries. Victim Services is assisting tenants impacted.

Staff of the Housing Facilities and Housing Services teams of the Human Services Department will work on building remediation and serving tenants' immediate needs.

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

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
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Bruce County Advocating For Local Needs at ROMA Conference

Bruce County Warden Luke Charbonneau and Deputy Warden Don Murray will make delegations to the following provincial leaders:

About Bruce County

Situated within the traditional territory of the Saugeen Ojibway Nation, Bruce County is home to nearly 75,000 residents in predominantly rural communities. Nestled between Lake Huron and Georgian Bay, we are celebrated for our natural heritage and as a destination for Ontarians.

Agricultural Impact: Agriculture is central to Bruce County's economy and identity, with nearly 2,000 farms generating over \$255 million annually in gross sales. Notably, Bruce County produces 22% of Ontario's beef.

Energy Leadership: Bruce County supplies 30% of Ontario's electricity and is vital to the electrification of Canadian society. Key initiatives include Bruce Power's Major Component Replacement, pre-development work for 4,800 megawatts of new nuclear generation, a pumped storage facility, and a large-scale battery storage facility.

Global Healthcare: Our region provides a significant share of the world's medical isotopes, essential for sterilizing equipment and treating cancer.

Future Growth: Bruce County is projected to grow by over 20,000 residents by 2045.

Since 2021, inflation has consistently exceeded historical norms, placing unprecedented strain on municipal finances across Ontario. Municipal funding models remain unresponsive to inflationary pressures, exacerbating the challenge. According to the Federation of Canadian Municipalities, municipalities receive only 8 cents of every tax dollar, while shouldering responsibility for much of the infrastructure and services essential to daily life.

The Association of Municipalities of Ontario has called for a renewed municipal funding model through a Social and Economic Prosperity Review. Their initial findings reveal that municipalities are using property taxes to maintain services in areas of provincial responsibility. Bruce County has contributed over \$126 million through the tax levy to areas identified by the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) as provincial responsibilities. These areas include long-term care, paramedics, public health, Ontario Works, and housing.

In addition to this financial burden, Bruce County faces several other challenges that put significant pressure on its resources and residents:

Housing Affordability: 45% of renters in Bruce County spend more than 30% of their income on housing. Dwelling values have increased by 76% between 2016 and 2021, a rate 17% higher than the provincial average, making housing affordability a growing challenge.

Labour Market: The Stratford-Bruce Economic Region reported an unemployment rate of 3.6% in December 2024, continuing a decade-long trend of having one of the lowest unemployment rates in Canada. Bruce County's living wage is \$22.75 per hour - one of the highest in Ontario, second only to the Greater Toronto Area (GTA). These factors make it increasingly difficult for local employers to attract and retain skilled workers.

Funding Disparities: Bruce County receives the lowest provincial and federal funding compared to six similar upper-tier county governments. This shortfall limits the County's ability to effectively address critical needs in housing, transit, infrastructure, social assistance, childcare, long-term care, energy, health care, and other essential municipal services.

Celebrate Black History Month with a story highlighting cultural resilience and the fight for recognition. Bruce County Public Library's Port Elgin Branch brings the award-winning short documentary Patty vs. Patty to the community. This documentary, which won the 2023 Canadian Screen Award for Best Short Documentary, explores the bizarre story of the 1985 Toronto 'Patty Wars,' when Canadian federal food inspectors deemed that Jamaican beef patties were illegally named and threatened vendors with fines up to \$5,000 (now over \$11,100). Vendors resisted, refusing to rename the beloved Jamaican snack, creating a unique and inspiring chapter in Canada's history.

The event will take place on Sunday, February 2, at 2pm, at the Port Elgin Branch and will begin with opening remarks from Executive in Charge of Production for CBC Docs Lesley Birchard. Following the screening, the film's director, Chris Strikes, will join us virtually for a live Q&A session. To add even more flavour, attendees will enjoy a patty tasting session, courtesy of Coral's Caribbean from Wiarton.

"This event is a wonderful way to bring history to life for our community, and a chance to reflect on a cultural story while savouring a piece of that history with delicious patties,' said Library Director, Brooke McLean.

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



Meanwhile, municipalities across Ontario continue to subsidize provincial responsibilities by almost \$5 billion annually, straining their ability to fund local priorities. Since 2020, Bruce County has contributed over \$126 million through the tax levy to areas identified by the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) as provincial responsibilities. These areas include long-term care, paramedics, public health, Ontario Works, and housing. The challenges are exacerbated by unprecedented growth pressures, climate-related infrastructure demands, and a housing affordability crisis that disproportionately impacts communities like Bruce County.

To address these systemic issues, Bruce County supports the Association of Municipalities of Ontario's (AMO) call for a Social and Economic Prosperity Review. This joint provincial-municipal review would update the provincial-municipal fiscal relationship, ensuring sustainability for both levels of government, fairness for taxpayers, and equity for communities. Bruce County urges the provincial government to prioritize this initiative in the 2025 budget and work collaboratively to build a funding framework that supports Ontario's municipalities as they address today's challenges while planning for the future.

"Bruce County is proud to be a critical partner in feeding and powering Ontario - supporting the province's energy, housing, and economic development priorities," says Warden Luke Charbonneau. "Bruce County remains committed to working collaboratively with the provincial government to make life better for our residents and businesses."

Bruce County has worked with provincial counterparts over the past year to identify areas that would support our success in continuing to power the province:

Access to Infrastructure Funds:

Earmark infrastructure funding specifically for rural municipalities like Bruce County to ensure they can support growth, address infrastructure gaps, and continue delivering critical services for the province.

Funding for Energy Host Communities:

Expand funding to municipalities hosting energy project expansions and develop a principle-based framework to ensure host communities are supported in their engagement with impact assessments and licensing processes.

Poverty Reduction:

Fix social assistance rates and reform the Ontario Works system to enable recipients to achieve financial independence and meet local workforce needs. Ontario Works rates have not increased in six years despite inflation, leaving individuals in poverty and increasing strain on municipalities delivering Ontario Works. Rates and the system are insufficient to prepare clients for financial independence and workforce participation.

Rural Transit:

Make the Community Transit Grant permanent and expand funding eligibility to municipalities like Bruce County to establish and sustain rural transit systems beyond reliance on property tax revenues.

Community Safety & Wellbeing:

Provide sustained provincial funding for Community Safety and Well-being initiatives to ensure their continued success and cost savings. The province mandated municipalities to create Community Safety and Wellbeing Plans but provided no ongoing funding to sustain their implementation.

Rural Health Care:

Pilot a mandatory municipal role in OHT governance in Bruce County to address the unique healthcare needs of rural communities.

Housing Affordability:

Amend O. Reg 221/07 to allow Bruce County to create an upper-tier CIP to streamline housing solutions, reduce administrative burdens, and accelerate affordable housing development.

Long-Term Care:

Work with Bruce County to develop sustainable funding models for municipal long-term care that recognize inflationary pressures, resident acuity, and the unique contributions of municipal LTC homes.

In January 2025, Bruce County has shared a detailed Pre-Budget Consultation Submission with the Honourable Peter Bethlenfalvy, Minister of Finance, Lisa Thompson, MPP, Rick Byers, MPP, and the Association of Municipalities of Ontario.
