February 26, 2025

Effective February 26, 2025, Bruce County Transportation & Environmental Services Department will place weight/load restrictions of 5 tonne per axle on several County roads until further notice. Please refer to the <u>Weight Load Restrictions Map.pdf</u> to verify the impacted Bruce County roads.

Bruce County staff have implemented road weight/load restrictions to protect the integrity of our road infrastructure. During spring thaw, roads are susceptible to damage and the reduction of axle-weights helps preserve the life span of Bruce County roads.

Are You Prepared for Communications in an Emergency?

Bruce County, Ontario: When we think of emergencies, we often picture tornadoes, floods, or power outages. But what if the crisis impacted something we rely on daily—our ability to communicate? In an increasingly connected world, a failure of phone networks or internet services can leave families struggling to reach one another. That's why including a communications plan in your emergency preparedness strategy is crucial.

Cell phone networks and internet services can go down due to severe weather, cyberattacks, or infrastructure failures. Having a plan in place can ensure you and your loved ones stay connected when it matters most.

How to Prepare for a Communications Failure:

Keep a landline phone at home. Ensure it will still work during a power outage and consider having a battery backup.

Use a generator wisely. If you have one, test it before an emergency to understand how many devices it can support. Unplug non-essential appliances to extend its capacity.

Have a hard copy of key contacts. Store written phone numbers for family, emergency services, and medical providers in case your phone battery dies, or digital records are inaccessible.

Set a family meeting location. If phone contact isn't possible, agree in advance on a place to reunite.

Know your child's school emergency plan. Schools have procedures in place for communication failures—ensure your family's plan aligns with theirs.

Back up essential documents. Print copies of medical records, insurance information, and emergency plans. Store them in a waterproof container and keep digital backups on an external drive or in the cloud.

Prepare for recovery. Regularly back up important computer files so you can quickly regain access to critical information after an outage.

"We rely so heavily on our phones and computers that a communications failure can cause significant stress," says Ray Lux, Bruce County Emergency Management Coordinator. "Having a backup plan will help keep your loved ones safe and ensure you can stay connected when it matters most. Talk to your family now, so you're prepared before an emergency happens."



- Southerly Alternative Truck Route: Grey County Road 10 → Concession 10E (Carrick) → Highway 9

Archives Awareness Week Talk at Bruce County Museum & Cultural Centre to highlight Bruce County's 160th Battalion Soldiers

Bruce County, Ontario: The Bruce County Museum & Cultural Centre is pleased to present *Bruce in Battle: Life in the 160th Battalion* as part of Archives Awareness Week. Happening on April 12 at 2:00 PM, this talk will explore the experiences of Bruce County's 160th Battalion soldiers during the First World War, featuring a presentation by military historian and researcher Kent Kraemer.

Since 2015, Kraemer has chronicled the 160th Battalion's day-to-day activities through the 160th Bruce Battalion Facebook page. During his talk, he will share incredible stories of Bruce County's soldiers, including "Paddy" Pettigrew and his championship wiring team, as well as Robert Clarke Rowand, the most highly decorated soldier of the 160th Battalion. In recognition of Archives Awareness Week, Kraemer will also discuss his inspiration for researching the Battalion, insights from the *Bruce in Khaki* newspaper, and the valuable role played by the Bruce County Museum & Cultural Centre's Archives and other historical repositories in his work.

Following the presentation, attendees will have the opportunity to join Archives staff for a behind-the-scenes tour of the archival storage area, where they can view rare archival items that are not often on display. Visitors will also be able to explore the exhibits at the Bruce County Museum & Cultural Centre, where a tour guide will be present in the military gallery to share additional stories about Bruce County soldiers.

In addition, the Archives & Research Room will be open for free admission during Ontario's Archives Awareness Week, which runs from April 7 to April 12.

Community Partners Unite to Combat Human Trafficking across the Region

Human Trafficking is a serious crime that often goes unnoticed, but communities in Grey and Bruce Counties are taking action. The CSWBP Crime Prevention Action Table in partnership with the Joy Smith Foundation and Violence Prevention Grey Bruce are raising awareness about the dangers of human trafficking and providing resources to help prevent this crime.

Short-term rentals (STR) owners and operators can play a crucial role in preventing human trafficking by recognizing signs, implementing preventative measures, and reporting suspicious activity. There is a growing trend of traffickers using STRs due to the greater possibility of anonymity. This initiative educates STR owners and operators on how to identify potential trafficking situations and respond appropriately to protect their communities and properties.

Key Warning Signs of Human Trafficking in Short-Term Rentals

- Frequent use of short-term rentals
- Last-minute bookings and multiple bookings that are in the same area
- People arriving and departing from your property with minimal luggage not appropriate for the length of stay
- Individuals that appear to be under the control of another person

How to Deter Human Traffickers from Choosing your Rental

- Screen bookings carefully including guest reviews from other STR
- Don't accept last-minute bookings
- Install cameras on the outside of your property to record those coming and going
- Do not allow guests to have unregistered guests on your property
- State clearly in your listing that you are committed to preventing human trafficking and other illegal activities

Human Trafficking affects communities across Canada, and awareness is the first step in preventing it. By educating STR owners/operators and the public, Grey and Bruce Counties are working together to create a safer and more informed community.

Bruce County Responds to Tariffs with Support & Advocacy

Bruce County, Ontario: In response to tariffs on Canadian goods, Bruce County is taking action to support local businesses and mitigate the economic impact on the region. With key sectors such as agriculture, energy, and tourism facing heightened uncertainty, Bruce County has launched a comprehensive strategy focusing on advocacy, business support, and local economic resilience.

To address these challenges, Bruce County has outlined these key actions:

- Advocacy at the Provincial and Federal Levels Bruce County is calling on higher levels of government to provide municipalities with greater flexibility to respond to tariffs and support local businesses.
- Business Support Framework & Action Bruce County is working with local businesses to assess the impact of tariffs and educate businesses on the resources available to respond. We are also implementing targeted support measures to address Bruce County specific challenges.
- Support Local Campaign Bruce County is a launching a campaign to encourage residents and visitors to support local businesses with their purchases and encourage Canadians to plan their local vacations in Bruce County.
- Change to Municipal Procurement Where allowable under trade agreements, Bruce County will prioritize purchasing from Canadian and local suppliers

"Bruce County is taking action to combat the negative effects of these tariffs," said Warden Luke Charbonneau. "And we are advocating for federal and provincial policies to support and protect our businesses and residents." Bruce County will continue monitoring economic conditions and adjust its response as needed. Every household should have an easily accessible Emergency Preparedness Kit in case you are required to shelter in place during an emergency. A well-stocked kit takes some planning and should be reviewed at least once a year to ensure it's ready when you need it most. Here are a few helpful tips to guide your spring refresh:

- **Replenish your water supply** to meet your family's drinking needs for at least three days.
- **Check expiry dates** on non-perishable food items and replace as needed.

Re: Request for County Accessibility Coordinator

The County of Bruce acknowledges receipt of the Municipality of Kincardine's resolution dated October 9, 2024, requesting consideration to create a County Accessibility Coordinator position.

Unfortunately, the request was received after the County's budget meeting held on October 10th and was not considered as part of the 2025 budget. Government grants to fund a full-time accessibility coordinating position are not currently available. Staff will continue to monitor funding opportunities to support accessibility.

The County recognizes the importance of improving accessibility and will consider a County-wide Accessibility Coordinator position, or opportunities to fund shared resources, in a future years' budgets.

In the meantime, the County remains committed to working collaboratively with the local municipal staff to enhance accessibility through shared training and educational opportunities.
