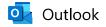

# **2025 Provincial Election Results**

After a short election campaign period, on February 27, 2025, Ontario voters re-elected the Progressive Conservative (PC) Party to a third majority in the Ontario legislature. Precedent and tradition suggest that Lt. Governor Edith Dumont will ask Doug Ford to continue as Premier of Ontario and form another Government. The New Democratic Party (NDP) will continue to serve as the official opposition.

The Ontario Liberal Party regains official party status by securing 14 seats in the legislature. This means that they will have more resources at their disposal to hire staff, conduct research, and support communications — ultimately allowing them to be a more effective political party. The Green Party of Ontario return to the legislature with the two seats they held previously.

## 2025 Results

The results for the 2025 Provincial election are as follows:

While PC, NDP, and Green Party leaders were elected in their ridings, Liberal leader Bonnie Crombie was unable to secure a seat.

## **Municipal Interests**

There were several current and former municipal council members who ran provincially as well as one current municipal staffer:

- Town of Thessalon mayor, Bill Rosenberg, who flipped the Algoma-Manitoulin seat from NDP to PC.
- Town of Halton Hills councillor, Joseph Racinsky, who won for the PCs in Wellington (formerly held by Ted Arnott).
- Former City of Ottawa councillor, and senior city administrator, Catherine McKenney kept the Ottawa Centre riding for the NDP.
- City of Ottawa councillor, George Darouze, retained the Carleton seat for the PCs.
- Town of Arnprior councillor, Billy Denault, won for the PCs in Renfrew-Nipissing-Pembroke (formerly held by John Yakabuski).
- City of Hamilton's former director of licensing and bylaw enforcement, Monica Cirello, won Hamilton Mountain for the PCs.

## What's Next

According to some media reports, the legislature may resume on March 3, however, as of the release of this update, the legislature site has not yet been updated. Whenever it does return, we can expect the PC Party to begin acting on their new Government mandate. The new parliament will begin with a new Speech from the Throne outlining the Government's priorities. Based on commitments made during the campaign period, these could include:

- Measures to protect Ontario residents, businesses, municipalities and the overall economy from US tariffs
- Infrastructure spending including building a tunnel for the 401
- Investments to connect Ontarians with a family doctor and primary care
- Legislation to ban the use of congestion pricing on all provincial and municipal roadways
- Permanently cutting the provincial gas tax by 5.7 cents per litre and diesel by 5.3 cents
- Reintroducing legislation to provide municipalities with tools to manage encampments

As an Association, we look forward to working with the Ford Government in their new mandate and we will continue to advocate on behalf of members and municipal staff for *Functional* 

*Foundations* that focus on building frameworks to support effective policy-making, efficient and sustainable resident and community service delivery.

This includes advocating for:

- A social and economic prosperity review
- Legislative updates to modernize the *Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* (MFIPPA), *Municipal Act* (MA), and *Municipal Elections Act* (MEA)
- · Updated accountability and transparency frameworks that protect municipal staff
- The removal of strong mayor authority over the role of the chief administrative officer and municipal staff

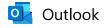

# AMO Policy Update – Communities Brace for Tariff Impact

## **US President Trump Makes Good on Tariff Threats**

US tariffs became a reality as of 12:01 a.m. today, initiating a trade war between our countries.

The US imposed a 25 per cent levy on Canadian and Mexican goods, with a lower 10 per cent levy on energy and critical minerals. The Canadian government has responded with counter-tariffs on \$30 billion of US goods, which will rise to \$155 billion in 21 days. Ontario is advancing and considering its own retaliatory measures, including some that could significantly impact municipalities. These may include:

- Banning US companies from procurement contracts. It is unclear if any procurement restrictions would apply to municipalities
- Halting export of nickel and critical minerals, impacting local industry
- Implementing a 25 per cent tax on electricity exports when the legislature returns and potentially cutting off the flow entirely. Ontario's consumers and municipalities could see increased rates resulting from the revenue loss
- Cancelling its Starlink contract, which was going to provide highspeed internet access to rural and northern Ontarians starting this June.

These new tariff rates and additional US "reciprocal tariffs" said to be implemented in April could have substantial impacts on Ontario, especially in the most <u>trade-exposed communities</u> that produce automobiles and parts, steel, copper and other items.

# **AMO's Action**

AMO continues to highlight to federal and provincial governments' Ontario municipalities' desire to take action. Yesterday, AMO President Robin Jones wrote to the Premier to highlight municipal procurement, economic development functions, and infrastructure investment as key tools to deploy in support of communities and the economy at this critical time.

To ensure municipalities receive the most relevant news on tariff and trade actions, AMO has launched a <u>new web page</u> to centralize our resources. Here, members can find:

- Tariff impacts on planned municipal infrastructure expenditures. With input from municipal staff across the province, Oxford Economics <u>estimates</u> that tariffs could increase infrastructure costs over \$1 billion on nearly \$50 billion in planned expenditures over the next two years. Municipalities can use the 2.1% municipal capital cost increase to help inform decisions on upcoming contracts.
- Updates on any "Buy Canadian" initiatives so that municipalities can comply with standing trade agreements while supporting their local, Ontario and Canadian economies. To date, AMO has not received a response to its February <u>letter to the Ontario Secretary of Cabinet</u> with respect to the importance of collaborating with municipalities around procurement policies and strategies.
- Upcoming tools to estimate the impacts of trade and tariff measures on municipal expenditures and revenues including property taxes to ensure municipalities understand the changing fiscal environment.

AMO will continue to work with our partners in the business community as well as residential and civil construction industries to make the case for investing in municipal services such as social housing and local infrastructure as a stimulus measure. Infrastructure investments pay dividends in both the short and long term, as employing workers contributes to GDP growth and productivity.



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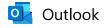

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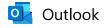

# AMO Policy Update – Continued AMO Action on Trade and Tariffs

## Investments in Community Housing as a Response to Tariffs

The introduction of US tariffs has already begun disrupting Ontario's economy. While we all remain hopeful for a resolution that avoids a negative impact on our communities, residents and industries, we must consider how to best to weather a potentially extended economic downturn.

Last week, <u>AMO wrote to the Premier</u> highlighting how investments in municipal infrastructure could protect vital construction jobs while driving future productivity. Today, AMO wrote a <u>follow-up letter</u> to share a <u>new</u> <u>report</u> that builds the business case for investments in community housing as a response to tariffs.

Investments in community housing have been an important element to past responses to economic downturns. These investments can both provide a secure pipeline of projects for the residential construction sector and contribute to Ontario's long-term productivity.

AMO is calling for an immediate new investment of \$1.5 billion over 2025/26 and 2026/27 for new capital development, capital repairs to existing stock, and acquisition and rehabilitation of existing buildings to protect Ontario. These investments would protect jobs in the residential construction sector while supporting increased productivity and economic growth. This would help Ontario's residents, communities, and industry leave this time of uncertainty even stronger and more economically resilient. In addition to this report, AMO is developing other resources to help municipalities chart an informed path through these uncertain times. We have released a number of data requests in the past weeks to support these efforts and would like to thank every municipality for their contributions to this united effort.



# **New & Returning Cabinet Ministers**

Earlier this afternoon (Wednesday, March 19, 2025) a new cabinet was sworn in by Lieutenant Governor Edith Dumont. While returning with a rare third legislative majority, the Progressive Conservative party saw a slight reduction of seats. There are 37 ministers including the Premier and Deputy Premier.

Premier Ford retained the Ministry of Intergovernmental Affairs and Sylvia Jones remains Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. Of particular interest to our members and the municipal sector are the following cabinet appointments (*\* indicates minister change*):

- Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing: Rob Flack\*
- Associate Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing: Graydon Smith\*
- Attorney General: Doug Downey

- Associate Attorney General: Michael Tibollo\*
- Minister of Education: Paul Calandra\*
- Minister of Finance: Peter Bethlenfalvy
- Minister of Public and Business Service Delivery and Procurement: Stephen Crawford\*
- Minister of Infrastructure: Kinga Surma
- Solicitor General: Michael Kerzner
- Minister of Red Tape Reduction: Andrea Khanjin\*
- Minister of Seniors and Accessibility: Raymond Cho

Other notable appointments include:

- Minister of Rural Affairs: Lisa Thompson
- Minister of Transportation: Prabmeet Sarkaria
- Minister of Emergency Preparedness and Response: Jill Dunlop\*

Additionally, the Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks will now have responsibility over conservation authorities, and the Minister of Energy and Mines and the Associate Minister of Energy-Intensive Industries will now have responsibility over broadband expansion and connectivity.

The full list of appointments to Cabinet is available here. Appointments to parliamentary assistant roles are expected to come later. To continue our Association's government relations and advocacy work, we will be sending letters of congratulations to the various ministers and the Premier.

The Legislature will return April 14, 2025. The new session must begin with the election of speaker and a Speech from the Throne outlining the Government's priorities for the parliamentary session. The speech will be read on April 15, 2025. It is widely expected that immediate priorities for this Government are to increase housing supply and affordability, address relief at the gas pumps, build highway infrastructure as well as address US tariffs.

A budget will also need to be introduced and passed. We took part in the province's pre-budget consultations prior to the election with our pre-budget submission that included series of recommendations focusing on improving the municipal-provincial relationship and fiscal arrangements. We hope to see some of these requests reflected in the Government's 2025 budget.

We look forward to meeting with the new members of cabinet and parliamentary assistants over the coming months to continue advocating for functional foundations (our local government priorities) among other member interests.



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

# AMO Policy Update – New Provincial Cabinet

## **Premier Ford Unveils New Cabinet**

Yesterday, Premier Ford unveiled his new cabinet following his government's electoral victory at the end of February. The cabinet is largely the same as its pre-election make-up, with some notable changes including the appointment of a new Minister and Associate Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing.

AMO is writing letters to these select Ministers to offer congratulations and advance AMO's top advocacy priorities:

- Rob Flack, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing and Graydon Smith, Associate Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing on the urgent need to:
  - Establish a more sustainable municipal-fiscal framework
  - Secure stimulus to enable municipalities to emerge stronger from trade disruptions and tariffs
  - Develop an 'all of government' plan to tackle homelessness, and
  - Implement municipal codes of conduct.
- Lisa Thompson, Minister of Rural Affairs on top rural municipal advocacy priorities including their access to housing-enabling infrastructure funding, homelessness, improving access to primary and hospital care, and supporting energy, broadband and cellular

infrastructure expansion.

- Vic Fedeli, Minister of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade offering support and collaboration in response to trade disruptions, including on reviewing inter-provincial trade barriers, retooling supply chains, and leveraging local municipal economic development capacity.
- Stephen Crawford, Minister of Public and Business Service Delivery and Procurement on the impact of international trade and tariff negotiations on municipal procurement and the need for provincial clarity on 'Buy Canadian' strategy in collaboration with our sector.
- Stephen Lecce, Minister of Energy and Mines on continued collaboration in support of successful long-term electricity procurements, finalization of the provincial Integrated Energy Plan and Natural Gas Policy, and clarity on the province's broadband implementation plan following Ontario's Starlink cancellation.
- Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health on the implementation of the Primary Care Action Plan, aligning public health standards to funding levels, making the community paramedic program permanent, and building a continuum of community mental health and addictions services to help tackle the root causes homelessness.
- Natalia Kusendova-Bashta, Minister of Long-Term Care on ensuring provincial operating grants better reflect real costs of operating municipal long-term care homes and reviewing proposed amendments to the *Fixing Long-Term Care Act*, 2021.
- Doug Downey, Attorney General on the need for a third-party review of the provincial offenses system.
- Michael Parsa, Minister of Children, Community and Social Services on development of a new administrative funding model for municipal delivery of social services, improvements to income security to help address the homelessness crisis, and preparing for a potential surge of asylum seekers.
- Paul Calandra, Minister of Education on advancing the extension and implementation of a renewed Canada Wide Early Learning and Child Care (CWELCC) bilateral agreement, and future planning for primary and secondary schools.

AMO will be engaging the Ministers of Finance and Infrastructure with a revised 2025 pre-budget submission. The submission will outline economic impacts of the ongoing trade war on municipalities. It will also call for stimulus investments in community housing and municipal infrastructure to help sustain Ontario's construction sector and invest in critical community infrastructure. Lastly, it will re-affirm the continued importance of action on <u>long-standing municipal priorities</u> including infrastructure, reducing municipal subsidies for areas of provincial jurisdiction, and tackling the root causes of homelessness.


