FCM outlines early priorities for Budget 2021

Canada's COVID-19 recovery will require a bold and creative plan, driven by cities and communities of all sizes. That's why, as part of the federal government's annual pre-budget consultations, FCM has written to the House of Commons finance committee to outline how Budget 2021 can help build a more prosperous, resilient and connected Canada for all.

Our preliminary recommendations include:

- Strengthening core infrastructure, tackling housing affordability and modernizing transit;
- Supporting municipal leadership on GHG reduction and climate adaptation;
- Moving faster to bring high-speed Internet to every Canadian and supporting communities facing economic uncertainty.

This is just the first step in our advocacy ahead of next year's federal budget, and we'll continue to refine our recommendations. At every step of the way, we'll make it clear that municipal leaders are essential partners in bringing Canada back stronger than ever.

Ottawa announces optional COVID-19 infrastructure funding stream

The federal government has introduced a new COVID-19 resilience stream into its Investing in Canada Infrastructure Plan (ICIP). Provinces and territories now have the option of directing a limited amount of existing ICIP funds to pandemic response projects—with simplified approvals and a higher federal cost-share. The federal government has also expanded eligibility criteria for existing ICIP funding streams, subject to negotiated amendments to federal-provincial/territorial Integrated Bilateral Agreements.

Making existing infrastructure funding more flexible will help support the work municipal leaders are doing on the ground. And it acknowledges that protecting Canadians starts locally.

93 participants chosen for FCM's climate leadership course

FCM has selected the participants for its first-ever climate leadership course for municipal elected officials. Those chosen have demonstrated local climate leadership and come from communities of all sizes across Canada. The course will build their knowledge and skills for applying a climate lens to municipal initiatives, engaging others on climate, and helping their communities take climate action.

Offered through the Municipalities for Climate Innovation Program (MCIP), the course takes place online in fall 2020 and concludes with an in-person summit planned for Ottawa in January 2021.

From derelict industrial site to sustainable arts hub

Municipalities continue to find creative ways to make housing both affordable and sustainable. With support from our Green Municipal Fund, the City of Toronto transformed a century-old industrial site into a sustainable hub for the arts community with 26 units of affordable housing. Artscape Wychwood Barns was rebuilt into energy-efficient, sustainable live-work spaces for working artists, surrounded by a park and skating rink.

How you register to vote in the FCM Board elections

Dear FCM members,

FCM's first-ever virtual Board elections and annual general meeting (AGM) are happening this fall. **Remember, only registered voters may participate in these elections and the AGM.** More information for non-voters wanting to attend the AGM will follow.

If you're eligible, you can register between August 24 and September 11.

The registration and voting process is outlined below. Please read it carefully.

Step 1: Registration

- Submit this registration form whether you're planning to vote online or by phone.

- While registering, you'll set up your **secret access code**, which you need throughout the elections process. Make sure you're the only one who knows your code!
- **Please complete the registration yourself so only you know your secret access code. Do not have someone else register on your behalf.**

Step 2: Voting

- You have three opportunities to vote:
 1. **Table Officers' election:** September 28-30
 2. **Directors' election:** October 5-7
 3. **Live voting during the AGM** (e.g., approving financial statements, ratifying the Board of Directors, etc.): October 15
- Before each election and the AGM, you'll get a **one-time-use link**. Click on it and enter your secret access code in order to retrieve your voting credentials (an automatically generated username and password). Use these to log into the voting platform.
- You'll use the same credentials in both elections and at the AGM. If you forget your credentials after the first election, don't worry. You'll get another **one-time-use link** to retrieve them before the second election and the AGM (using your secret access code).

Important: You can only use each of these links ONCE to retrieve your credentials.

Please add no-reply-fcm@secured.vote to your contacts so election-related emails from the voting platform don't go to your junk folder.


