

- In June we partnered with the OPP Highway Safety Division and the Ministry of Transportation to conduct a Commercial Motor Vehicle blitz. They achieved the following results:
- > 8 Level One Inspections
- > 9 Level Two Inspections
- > 14 Provincial Offences laid
- > 5 Commercial Motor Vehicles taken out of service

MARINE UPDATE

- 48 Calls for Service
- 256 Patrol Hours
- 208 Vessels checked
- 75% compliance rate down from our usual 92-95% compliance rate
- Increased education and warnings related to equipment violations
- Kayaks and Paddle Boards are considered Vessels under the Canada Shipping Act and therefore have equipment requirements
- Higher water levels allowed the marine operators to get the Harbercraft Skiff closer to shore – very well received by beach goers

GOOD NEWS STORY – 911 MISDIALS

- 2019 **145** 911 Misdials
- 911 Misdials were Huron-Kinloss' #1 call for service
- 2020 new OPP policy implemented to divert these calls where possible away from frontline
- 2020 26 911 Misdials dispatched to officers policing the Township of Huron-Kinloss
- 154 officer hours saved

A warrant conducted in Ripley in May resulted in the seizure of almost \$75,000.00 worth of drugs. Described as a "pharmacy" by the Community Street Crimes Unit who conducted the warrant the drugs seized ranged from Cocaine to Methamphetamine to Marijuana and everything in between. Also seized was a rifle and a stolen hand gun.

- Early in the New Year of 2020 we experienced the success of the Human
 Trafficking Community Awareness Sessions. Huron-Kinloss' was hosted in
 Lucknow. Overall approximately 300 community members across South Bruce
 benefitted from these sessions and we continue to receive positive feedback and
 requests for further presentations.
- The second year of the Community Safety and Policing grant for Human Trafficking and Sexual Violence was focused on Youth. We continue to work with the Catholic District School Board and the Bluewater District School Board in the hopes of having a session included in their curriculum.

- In March 2020, COVID 19 changed everyone's world and policing was no different.
 Our officers are fully equipped with Personal Protective Equipment and we have implemented procedures both in and outside of our workplaces to ensure the safety of our officers and the public.
- We have worked closely with the Township of Huron-Kinloss' ECG attending their meetings and working through mutual challenges.

- Our officers have responded to 53 COVID 19 related calls for service since March in the Township of Huron-Kinloss. These calls usually entail people looking for advice on the restrictions or reporting people for not abiding by the regulations.
- Our approach to the enforcement of the Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act and Re-Opening of Ontario Act is very measured and our officers conduct a lot of education on the restrictions. We have found most people are compliant and we have not laid any charges under the Act.
- The court was shut down until September but has now resumed mostly in a virtual fashion.

- · Our School Resource Officer (SRO) had to shift gears due to Covid 19 as well.
- Despite the school closure, she has obtained OPP Youth Foundation Funding for 8 students providing support from winter clothing to financial assistance for extra curricular activities.
- Lockdown drills and planning went ahead in September for all schools.
- Presentations have been created for an on-line format and 15 of them have been provided for at home students on Internet Safety/Consent. They have been very well received by the students.
- 4 Youth have been diverted from the court system through the involvement of our SRO.

- The Transfer of Care Protocol was signed between all Grey-Bruce Municipal Police Services, the Grey-Bruce OPP and the three Hospital groups in Grey-Bruce. This Protocol ensures a consistent and smooth transition of Mental Health patients from police to hospital staff improving outcomes for individuals apprehended by police under the Mental Health Act.
- The Community Safety and Well Being plan (CSWBP) has been completed. We are excited to be involved in the creation and implementation of the strategies to address the top risk factors identified in Grey-Bruce. We are very hopeful that together we will be able to address those risks and mitigate the underlying social issues that contribute to Crime.

- We are extremely excited to announce our partnership with the Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA) to create the Mobile Mental Health and Addictions Response Team that started on November 2nd.
- The clinicians are provided space in our Walkerton office and respond to Mental Health and Addictions related calls for service with our officers.
- Currently they are working with us three days a week, alternating days and evenings.

- We have welcomed two new recruits and one experienced officer to South Bruce in 2020.
- Three new recruits are currently at the Police College and will arrive in South Bruce at the end of June.
- We said good-bye to long time South Bruce Officer, Paul RICHARDSON. Paul was promoted to Inspector and is now the Detachment Commander in Wellington County.
- We were joined by S/Sgt Ryan OLMSTEAD at the beginning of February as our new Operations Manager. Ryan is an experienced OPS Manager who has transferred from Lambton County.
