renovations across Ontario this year.






conditions of Lake Huron fisheries and current fish rehabilitation projects that will help protect this important resource.




#### Coast Watchers 2021 Annual Report

Findings from the Coast Watchers Report include qualitative and quantitative measurements taken by Coast Watcher citizen scientists from May 2021 - October 2021. These findings enable us to compare 2021 data to previous years to **determine trends** or **altered findings** over Coast Watcher's **17 year data set**.

## Microplastic Awareness Project 2021 Results

Microplastic was found in 83.3% percent of the 24 samples collected at the beginning and end of the Coast Watcher season. When lake water samples

×	

were tested in 2018, **95.7%** of the samples contained microplastic. **Microfibers were the most common** microplastic found in **both** 2018 and 2021. This was expected since microfibers are **commonly released from clothing in washing machines.** If the washing machine does not have a microfiber filter they are released into the municipal wastewater system. Since microfibers are 100 times finer than a human hair, most wastewater treatment plants do not filter the fibers before they are released into Lake Huron.

Microplastic poses a risk to humans through contamination of drinking water. More research needs to be done to better understand how ingestion of microplastics can impact human health.

### What is Buried in your Beach?

Treasure hunting has always been a past-time common along Lake Huron beaches. Some beachcombers focus on rocks of different colours and shapes, some go for the unusual piece of flotsam, while plastic shovels and pails meticulously create large water filled depressions for catching "elephants" and other imaginary species.

However, these past few years of high water on Lake Huron have uncovered all sorts of different items that were either forgotten or misunderstood. Wave action does an amazing job of redistributing beach material regardless of the material being sand, cobbles or rocks. This story is part of a series of articles titled "What is Buried in Your Beach?" planned to continue in future e-newsletters and will describe some of the items that our Coast Watchers and staff at the Coastal Centre have found over the past few years.

#### Buried Treasure – "Ship A-hoy!"

Point Clark, Huron Kinloss, Bruce County

The beach immediately south of Point Clark is a cobble beach with stones and elongated shaped rock deposits, shaped by the action of waves along this rocky point. Residents for several years have been collecting water-smoothed lumber and timbers that have been found scattered along the shore. It was only when in the spring of 2021 the partial deck of a former sailing ship was revealed complete with iron bars exposed those residents realized what was emerging was a ship wreck.

Marine archeologists were contacted, and the ship has been confirmed to be a schooner, named Homer Hine that sunk in 1883. Local media reported the beach treasure in May, 2021 describing the find and how the local community responded by assembling the found pieces and providing them to the archeologists for further analysis.



And what about you? What have you found? If you have an interesting item that was uncovered by the waves of Lake Huron, let us know so that we can include your description of them and a photo in future articles.

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## FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

## Spring is in the air. First signs of spring are popping up around us.

Robin sightings, small flowers emerging from the earth, rainy days that wash away the snow and before we know it, we'll be turning off the furnace, opening windows and diving into spring cleaning. It's also the time of year to book summer campsites, sign the kids up for camp and chart out the rest of our year.

On Friday, March 25, the Clean Energy Frontier Regional Steering Committee came together to review the plan for the rest of 2022. The Committee received an update on the program, including campaign plans, events and other activities. We used this time to share economic development ideas and discuss our clean energy future.

With the Committee's support, the Clean Energy Frontier program will be advancing a Collaborative Marketing and Outreach Campaign. It's important to note the plan will not advance in its entirety until Rural Economic Development provincial funding has been secured.



The Clean Energy Frontier program continues to drive the conversation of electric vehicles and public charging infrastructure. By working with the regional network group, comprised of Bruce, Grey, Huron, Wellington, Dufferin and Perth, NII is able to provide early insight to the group, leveraging its Plugging In report (2021) and other pending data.

In Q2, NII will host a conversation to define the economic benefit of public charging infrastructure and to understand challenges associated with the transition to electric vehicles. The Clean Energy Frontier program will be inviting tourism stakeholders, local distributors, Bruce Power Net Zero Inc. and other partners to the table.





#### **DID YOU KNOW...**

More than \$233 million is collected through this region's municipal tax because of the clean energy sector? The vast majority of this stays right here in Bruce, Grey and Huron counties.



Data from our tourism focused conversation, learnings from the regional network group and other infrastructure projects in the region will support the development of Plugging In 2.0 (to be released in Q3).

New opportunities continue to emerge in the Clean Energy Frontier region of Bruce, Grey and Huron, just like those tiny spring flowers on my front yard.



## FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

**MARCH 2022** 

Welcome to the first edition of our quarterly newsletter from the Municipal Innovation Council. Here you'll get updates on the exciting projects and happenings taking place in 2022!

Just a few weeks ago, the Municipal Innovation Council (MIC) wrapped up the last delegation to elected officials across the member municipalities to highlight some of the collaborative work taking place at the MIC.

#### **Joint IT Business Analysis Review**

The final report and five-year roadmap from our work with GHD Digital is now complete and will be coming to councils soon.

Below is a snapshot of what could be realized through collaborative purchasing of software and hardware over the next five years as we modernize our IT and digital services.

#### **Summary of Potential Cost Savings**

#### Potential Joint Cost Savings

The Table below summarizes the joint results of the Potential Cost Savings analysis for all of the in–scope items, for all 8 Municipalities.

The same information as the table above is also reflected in the following graph. The first series of bars for each year repersents the savings for hardware (light grey), the middle bars for each year (mid-tone grey) repersent software savings, and the last series of bars (black) repersent the total savings for hardware plus software

#### **Mapping our Future**

The MIC has received the first set of mapping data from Ecopia AI that will allow us to complete reporting requirements for the NDMP funding. Over the next few months we'll be integrating the new data into ARC GIS and sharing with local Municipalities, Conservation Authorities and Saugeen Ojibway Nation (via the Environment Office).







#### **DID YOU KNOW...**

The Municipal Innovation Council has leveraged almost \$500,000 in external funding to support work on the Joint IT Business Analysis Review, Smart Beach Project and the MIC's mapping project, Mapping our Future.

Work on the **Smart Beach Project** is ramping up and we look forward to the official launch May 25th at Station Beach. The lead researcher, Dr. Chris Houser will be visiting the Municipality of Kincardine April 7th and 8th to engage with key stakeholders, meet with municipal staff and walk Station Beach to get input and local knowledge that will be invaluable to the success of the project.

In early March, we hosted five virtual workshops for municipal staff that focused on creating more welcoming communities in our rural region.

Over 150 staff from across Grey and Bruce County participated.

Thanks to a partnership with the Grey Bruce Local Immigration Partnership were able to provide these workshops free of charge.



#### **OPG in Bruce County – Community Update – April 2022**

**You've got mail:** Any day now, 39,000 households in the Bruce area will get Canada Post's delivery of the 2022 edition of *Neighbours*, a four-page newsletter for people living near Ontario Power Generation (OPG) facilities at the Bruce nuclear site. It's part of OPG's commitment to keep people informed about our activities, in the communities where we operate. Stories include: OPG's Nuclear Sustainability Services and its mission to embrace the three Rs (reduce, reuse, recycle), ground-breaking for a new sorting and recycling facility in Kincardine, and OPG's ongoing support for local community initiatives. For a sneak preview, you can also download the PDF from OPG's website at <a href="https://www.opg.com/southwestern">www.opg.com/southwestern</a> (scroll halfway down the page to the *Neighbours* item).

**See you at CNA:** I look forward to reconnecting with others from across the nuclear sector and its host communities, including Kincardine – in Ottawa this April 12-14 at the <u>Canadian Nuclear Association 2022 annual conference</u>, themed "Together for Net Zero." Be sure to visit OPG's booth in the main conference-level corridor at the Westin Hotel – as well as OPG's commercial subsidiary, Laurentis Energy Partners, which has a booth in the Trade Show. If you're there, I'm confident you'll spot me despite my mask, which I plan to wear even as the pandemic enters its third year. Nuclear professionals know how to prioritize safety, balanced with useful collaboration across our industry. CNA has designed an exciting program, focused on new nuclear technologies, action on climate change, and advancing reconciliation through Indigenous partnerships.

#### Around Ontario and beyond:

- **Hydrogen pilot:** As part of Ontario's first-ever <u>Low-Carbon Hydrogen Strategy</u>, the government is supporting a proposal from Atura Power, an OPG subsidiary, to build, own and operate the province's largest low-carbon hydrogen production facility, in Niagara Falls. This project alone would expand the province's hydrogen production capacity eight-fold. Hydrogen is a versatile fuel for vehicles, industrial processes and heating homes and businesses while emitting little to no greenhouse gases. Atura Power's pilot project is expected to support net emission reductions equivalent to taking more than 4,000 cars off the road.
- **Progress on SMRs:** OPG is positioning to be a world leader in new nuclear development, as the company works toward building Canada's first grid-scale Small Modular Reactor (SMR). Site preparation has begun at the Darlington New Nuclear Project, which aims to deploy a 300-megawatt SMR by the end of the decade. Once built, it could power about 300,000 homes, create about 2,500 jobs over its 60-year lifespan, increase GDP by \$2.5 billion, and become a vital tool in Ontario's fight against climate change.

• **Birds and bees:** Congratulations to OPG's Niagara Operations, which once again received Gold certification from the Wildlife Habitat Council (WHC). The three-year designation recognizes the outstanding <u>environmental and biodiversity work</u> at OPG's Niagara sites, including nesting boxes for migratory birds, habitats for pollinating honey bees, and a partnership with Niagara College to improve turtle nesting sites. Similarly, OPG's Western facility at the Bruce nuclear site received its first WHC Gold certification in 2021.



After moving to the area during lockdown, Stuart McGrath was proud to take part in his first ever 'Lots of Socks' day celebration in support of World Down Syndrome Day.

Stuart and his mother Susan recently relocated to the quiet village of Tiverton after living in Milton for many years. Neither of them had heard about the worldwide 'Lots of Socks' movement and weren't quite sure what to make of it all when Stuart was first asked to participate.

Stuart, who loves the spotlight, has been photographed for newspapers many times before, but this was the first time he has ever taken part in a professional photo shoot.

"I was a star!" said Stuart. His mom Susan agreed that he was a natural in front of the camera and is thrilled with the shot of him throwing a rock down the ice at the Kincardine Curling Club.

Stuart chose the curling rink for his photoshoot location as it is his favourite sport to play and 'I am very good at playing it!'. This fall, he joined the Kincardine Special Olympics curling team and has really enjoyed the practices and getting to know his teammates.

On the Sunday before World Down Syndrome Day, Stuart and his mom visited several stores and businesses to see the completed 'Lots of Socks' displays. Stuart was decked out in socks from head to toe and got many compliments from those passing by on the street. He particularly enjoyed seeing the displays at the UBC Carpenter's Union, which included his portrait, and the decorations at the OPP station.

Susan was impressed that so many businesses took part and that there is such a focus on education and inclusion. "It's important for everyone to recognize that people with Down Syndrome are a part of our community. I really like that the children get to be a part of it as well so they can learn more about it," said Susan.

Stuart and his mom are both looking forward to next year's Lots of Socks campaign already. Stuart is on the hunt for some unique Harry Potter or wrestling socks and Susan's niece plans to create a display at her workplace in Southampton.

The community support for the Lots of Socks day campaign is just one of the reasons Susan and Stuart are happy they moved to Tiverton. They like being closer to family and describe the community as 'so happy, friendly and welcoming'. Susan notes that people have been particularly kind to Stuart and that neighbours check in if they haven't seen him out for his daily walk in a few days. "He's so outgoing and loves to talk to the cashiers at No Frills about his favourite movies" she said.

Stuart says that if you recognize him from his Lots of Socks portrait, or see him out and about in the community, he would love it if you stop to say hello! With COVID-19 restrictions easing,

he is really looking forward to getting more involved in his new community, meeting new people and making new friends.

Our annual "Lots of Socks" campaign broke the record for most posters distributed in one year! This year, CLKD distributed approximately 120 posters and portraits throughout the Municipality of Kincardine and the Township of Huron-Kinloss in support of World Down Syndrome Day.

Businesses decorated their windows with messages of inclusion, posters about World Down syndrome Day and its goals, portraits of our local models and, of course, SOCKS! Once the socks were hung and the windows were ready, businesses submitted photos of their displays for voting. The community had the weekend to vote for their favourite display and at noon on
