8. Member Updates and Open Discussion

Township of Huron-Kinloss noted that their digital modernization project will be presented to Council in February which includes a recommendation for an enterprise system "TownSuite". She will share with other municipalities looking for a new system.

Brockton is implementing modernization funding for budget software RFP, working through municipal app and e-permitting, following through strategic action plan guiding actions, and working on budget.

Northern Bruce Peninsula will have their first budget meeting on Monday. They are working on the parks and recreation master plan, housing sustainability, tourism master plan, short term accommodation and municipal accommodation tax.

Kincardine is proceeding with their municipal modernization funding for procurement, they are in the budget process.

South Bruce is moving forward with a legal RFP process, implementing meeting management software and an RFP for budgeting software.

The County of Bruce Planning and Development brought forward a discussion paper on the Official Plan business and connecting, a new Indigenous planning initiative has been approved and they are working through their modernization funding projects.

Saugeen Shores has a joint delegation scheduled with County at the ROMA conference to discuss inclusionary zoning for affordable housing and broadening the scope. Saugeen First Nation and Saugeen Shores were successful in a joint application to the Community Economic Development Initiative three-year program to improve economic prosperity. They are working on funding projects for digital records management, Microsoft 365, office spaces to promote remote work. Budget adoption is scheduled for Monday.

Recommendation

Overview

In March 2021, the Town of Saugeen Shores applied for Municipal Modernization Funding with the goal to support MIC member municipalities with IT infrastructure and servicing. The application was approved in the amount of \$100,000.

Following the November MIC meeting, an RFP was posted to seek a consultant that could carry out the work for the Joint IT Business Analysis review. A letter was also drafted and sent to the Honourable Steve Clark, Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing to request an extension for the Municipal Modernization Program (MMP) funding.

On Tuesday December 21st, the RFP closed, and a review of proposals was completed by the Director and Darren Hill, Manager Information Technology at the Town of Saugeen Shores. On December 23rd, GHD Digital was awarded the contract for the MIC's Joint IT Business Analysis.

GHD Digital will share the findings and recommendations from the Digital Modernization and Joint IT Business Services Final Report with the MIC at the March 17th meeting.

Outcomes

The outcomes will highlight an implementation strategy that will assist the MIC member communities to prioritize investments that will improve efficiencies and highlight cost savings. There will be a specific focus on upgrading from the current state to support future needs with a coordinated approach to the consolidation of hardware and software spends, as well as development of a shared service model with the lower tiers. Also included is a centralized cybersecurity framework including cost-effective methods of implementing these measures and recommendations to support ongoing cybersecurity prevention.

Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Training

Following budget approval for EDI training at the November 2021 MIC meeting, I engaged Parul Pandya from Community Impact Consulting and explored opportunities with Lorie Fioze, Manager of Strategic Initiatives to share the work she is leading around EDI in Kincardine with the MIC.

Given that each MIC member municipality is at various stages of advancing EDI in their respective communities, I am proposing that we schedule a training session in early March at the Nuclear Innovation Institute in Port Elgin with CAO's and their Senior Management Teams.

The training will consist of:

- Parul Pandya from Community Impact Consulting will lead a 2-hour, online workshop focused on *Understanding & Applying Anti-Oppression* that will include:
 - Understanding equity in practice
 - Engaging in conversations around common language and terms aligned with anti-oppression, anti-racism, and inclusion
 - Uncovering our own motivations to incite positive actions through each of our own avenues of access

• The session will be hosted at the NII. This will give us the opportunity to come together as a group and support the technical requirements for Parul to facilitate the training online.

Training fees

- 10 or less people: \$1000 + HST
- 11-19 people: \$1250 + HST
- 20-30 people: \$1500 + HST

Lorie Fioze has been leading an initiative in the Municipality of Kincardine to develop an inclusion, diversity, equity and access strategy. She has offered to come to the March MIC meeting to share her insights and experience around the work she is leading that will be helpful as the MIC municipalities consider this work in 2022.

Outcome/deliverables

- Anti-Oppression Everyday Toolkit
- Strategy development resources for participants to use in their respective community
- The Centre for Municipal Innovation will continue to support this initiative and expand training opportunities across MIC member municipalities in 2022.

The Centre for Municipal Innovation

The Centre for Municipal Innovation at the Nuclear Innovation Institute (NII) hosts this unique, leading-edge platform for like-minded municipalities to come together to build smarter, stronger, and more resilient communities.

The Centre serves lower and upper-tier municipalities in Bruce County. We seek to understand how issues impact people and act as a catalyst for developing solutions to shared problems.

By leveraging learning and collaboration with municipal members and other partners, we will enhance process, policy, and common practices across our region—leading to improved service delivery to residents and visitors.

Program Overview

The Municipal Innovation Council (MIC) was founded in 2020 when eight municipalities came together to identify better ways to deliver services and meet the needs of people in their communities.

The MIC, a joint body set up by an agreement between the Town of Saugeen Shores, Arran-Elderslie, Brockton, Bruce County, Huron-Kinloss, Kincardine, Northern Bruce Peninsula and South Bruce.

The MIC is a three-year pilot project aimed at finding – and implementing – smarter and more effective ways of delivering municipal services.

The MIC is the culmination of an agreement signed in 2020 between the Town of Saugeen Shores and NII, which gave Saugeen Shores a leadership role in developing the concept and establishing partnerships for the MIC to become a collaborative partnership across the region.

With the change in program director in October 2021 the MIC transitioned program delivery/operations from the Town of Saugeen Shores to NII.

The work of the Centre for Municipal Innovation is supported by the Municipal innovation Council consisting of a representative from each of the member municipalities.

Based on the feedback from the MIC member municipalities the areas of focus are:

Construction and Infrastructure: Growing communities require innovative solutions to support their construction and development industry while also keeping environmental sustainability top of mind.

Municipal Sustainability: In a time of unprecedented change and shift in the economy, public sector employers need to consider what sustainability means to their organizations

Information Technology & Digital Enhancements: The digital economy is here to stay and is key to our future success. Information technology is advancing quickly, and tech development comes with both risk and reward.

Livable communities: Being a livable community means access to affordable housing, transportation, healthcare, education, recreation and so much more.



Attached to this report is an overview of potential opportunities that the MIC could consider exploring if there is interest.

Biography

He also works with technology providers and municipalities to undertake projects that reduce energy usage, costs, and greenhouse gas emissions. Potential areas of opportunity for collaboration

 - OCWA piloting technology to reduce phosphorus in wastewater effluent

- 3) Process intensification: Introduce new treatment technologies to introduce process intensification to avoid big capital upgrades in existing treatment plant that are facing increased pressure for population growth and treatment demands
 - Ontario towns receive funding for waste management projects
 - <u>Coming soon: A less wasteful way to treat wastewater</u>
- 4) Energy optimization tools, sensors, KPI development and business decision making- demonstrate capturing key data and creating dashboard to provide KPIs that will enable decision makers to make decisions that will promote efficiency, cost savings etc.
 - Improving Operations and Water Quality with Remote Monitoring
- 5) Lagoon optimization: promote innovative sludge solutions that will save huge lagoon cleaning cost
- 6) Training and capacity building- developed training to create energy awareness and climate change for W/WW staff
